Editor's Choice

SHADOW TAG, by Louise Erdrich. (Harper/ HarperCollins, \$25.99.) Erdrich's new novel is a portrait of an "iconic" marriage on its way to dissolution, and it appears to be seeded with deliberate allusions to her own marriage with the writer Michael Dorris.

POINT OMEGA, by Don DeLillo. (Scribner, \$24.) The radical manipulation of time is explored in DeLillo's novel, which brings an Iraq war planner, his daughter and a filmmaker together at a house in the desert.

WHERE THE GOD OF LOVE HANGS OUT, by Amy Bloom. (Random House, \$25.) The upbeat sassiness of its cosmopolitan characters is just one of the treasures of this erotically charged story collection.

JESUS, JOBS, AND JUSTICE: African American Women and Religion, by Bettye Collier-Thomas. (Knopf, \$37.50.) How the church has figured in the lives of black women battling racism and sexism, from the days of slavery to the present.

THE IMMORTAL LIFE OF HENRIETTA LACKS,

by Rebecca Skloot. (Crown, \$26.) Skloot untangles the ethical issues in the case of a woman whose cancer cells have been the basis for a vast amount of research.

A MOUNTAIN OF CRUMBS: A *Memoir, by Elena Gorokhova. (Simon & Schuster, \$26.)* English became a secret path to personal freedom for Gorokhova, who escaped the confines of the Soviet Union at age 24.

UNINCORPORATED PERSONS IN THE LATE HONDA DYNASTY: Poems, by Tony Hoagland. (Graywolf, paper, \$15.) Like Larkin, Hoagland seems to draw inspiration from his own human frustration.

ORDINARY THUNDERSTORMS, *by William Boyd.* (*Harper/HarperCollins*, \$26.99.) Boyd's hero, a wanted man, is led into the darkest recesses of Big Pharma.

SAVAGE LANDS, by Clare Clark. (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, \$25.) Clark's tale of early French settlers in Louisiana is told in the spirit of a 19th-century novel.

Paperback Row

THE NORTHERN CLEMENCY, by Philip Hensher. (Anchor, \$16.95.) This big novel, a finalist for the 2008 Man Booker prize, follows two not quite uppermiddle-class families, neighbors in the northern English city of Sheffield, from the 1970s through the '90s. Full of detail and Dickensian minor characters, the novel suggests that the British obsession with domestic correctness is underscored by a desire for violence. Although the book contains no surprises, our reviewer, Sophie Gee, said it is "tremendously adroit" and reminds us of "what it's like to sink luxuriously into the great novels of an earlier era."

WE CAN HAVE PEACE IN THE HOLY LAND: A Plan That Will Work, by Jimmy Carter. (Simon & Schuster, \$15.) President Obama should embrace Arab-Israeli peacemaking with the goal of a two-state solution, Carter argues. And he should do it by following Carter's example of deep involvement and defiance of political calculations. "Carter's counsel lacks a couple of critical elements," Gershom Gorenberg said in the Book Review. "Nonetheless, it has much to recommend it." The Palestinian territories are the setting for the provocative and humane mysteries by Matt Beynon Rees (inset) featuring an aging schoolteacher, Omar Yussef. In THE SAMARITAN'S SECRET (Mariner/Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, \$13.95), Yussef helps investigate the theft of a priceless Torah scroll from the Samaritan sect's synagogue. Then a Samaritan priest's son, who turns out to have been the personal financial adviser to the late Palestinian president, is found murdered.

HOUSE OF CARDS: A Tale of Hubris and Wretched Excess on Wall Street, by William D. Cohan. (Anchor, \$16.95.) The Wall Street investment bank Bear Stearns took big risks (and made huge profits) on mortgages and securities, but a crisis of confidence destroyed it in March 2008. (JPMorgan Chase then bought it for a song.) Draw-

ing on interviews with employees — including the bank's megalomaniacal chief executive — and people at the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve, Cohan lays out the company's rise and fall.

TRIANGULAR ROAD: A Memoir, by Paule Marshall. (Basic Civitas, \$14.) In this brief memoir, Marshall — whose novel "Brown Girl, Brownstones," published 50 years ago, was a new kind of coming-of-age story, one from a black immigrant community — explores several places that are important in African-American history. "Africa, Barbados, Brooklyn — that's the triangle that defines me and my work," she told a reporter for The Times.

THE DECLINE AND FALL OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE 1781-1997, by Piers Brendon. (Vintage, \$20.) Starting with Cornwallis's surrender to Washington, Brendon moves from one continent to another, drawing on sources from official archives to Victorian memoirs. The narrative is necessarily complex but always well informed, and entertaining digressions enliven the story.

CAPITOL MEN: The Epic Story of Reconstruction Through the Lives of the First Black Congressmen, by Philip Dray. (Mariner/Houghton Mifflin, \$15.95.) This well-researched collective biography of several black congressmen in the South during Reconstruction includes figures like Hiram Rhodes Revels, the first African-American member of Congress, who in 1870 won the Senate seat from Mississippi once held by Jefferson Davis. Both exhilarating and disturbing, the book casts fresh light on both the positive and the negative aspects of Reconstruction.

THE LONG FALL, by Walter Mosley. (New American Library, \$14.) Mosley says he's through with Easy Rawlins, the hero of his Los Angeles series.

Here he presents a new hero, Leonid McGill, and a new city, present-day New York. McGill, a former boxer, has set up as a private eye to make amends for his sins as a mob fixer, but he finds it hard to escape the past. Our reviewer, Marilyn Stasio, said, "McGill is someone you can definitely settle down with."

THE RUNNER: A True Account of the Amazing Lies and Fantastical Adventures of the Ivy League Impostor James Hogue, by David Samuels. (Counterpoint, \$14.95.) Hogue, a con man in his 20s, got into Princeton by pretending to be a teenager from the West, an itinerant ranch hand who liked to read Plato. He excelled both academically and socially before he was recognized and arrested. Samuels teases out the story's implications, and his chapter on Hogue's Princeton application reads like a satire of the admissions process. "Nothing is lost on Samuels," Keith Gessen said in the Book Review, praising this "sophisticated" work.

WETLANDS, by Charlotte Roche. Translated by Tim Mohr. (Grove, \$14.) With its jaunty dissection of the sex life and private grooming habits of its 18-year-old narrator (who is recovering on a proctology ward after an intimate shaving accident), this novel was a best seller in Europe. Roche describes the book, her first, as an expression of "the feminism of the body."

SECURITY, by Stephen Amidon. (Picador, \$15.) Secret goings-on — "corruption, addiction, violence and sexual depravity," according to our reviewer, Joseph Salvatore — animate Amidon's sly, satiric novel. It is "'Peyton Place' in the age of terror and Twitter," Salvatore added.

Elsa Dixler
